Liquid Gold or Sugar Syrup? Identify Your Pure Honey, Spot Adulteration

which the increasing presence of adulterated honey in the market, consumers are becoming more concerned about ensuring they purchase pure and unprocessed honey. Many commercially available products are mixed with sugar syrups, artificial sweeteners, and preservatives, reducing their nutritional value. However, there are several effective methods to determine whether honey is genuine or artificially enhanced.

One of the most common tests to check honey's purity is the water test. A teaspoon of honey dropped into a glass of clean water should settle at the bottom without dissolving. If it dissolves quickly, it is likely mixed with water or glucose syrup. Another simple method is the thumb test, where a small drop of honey is placed on the thumb. Pure honey remains intact and does not spread, while adulterated honey, containing added moisture, will run off the skin.

A more unconventional but effective method is the flame test, which helps detect excess water in honey. A dry matchstick dipped in honey should ignite when struck against a matchbox if the honey is pure. If the matchstick fails to light, it suggests the presence of moisture or impurities. Similarly,

the vinegar test can expose added chemicals or artificial preservatives. Mixing a teaspoon of honey with a few drops of vinegar and water should not cause any reaction. If foaming or bubbling occurs, the honey has likely been tampered with.

Another simple test is the tissue paper test, which checks the water content in honey. A drop of honey placed on tissue paper should stay in place without seeping through. If it gets absorbed, it indicates high moisture content and possible adulteration. Additionally, examining the taste and aroma of honey can provide valuable clues. Natural honey has a rich, slightly floral taste and a mild, distinct aroma. In contrast, fake honey often tastes excessively sweet, similar to sugar syrup, and lacks a strong natural scent.

A key characteristic of pure honey is its natural ability to crystallize over time. Unlike artificially processed honey, which remains smooth and liquid due to added preservatives, real honey forms sugar-like granules as it ages. This crystallization process is entirely natural and does not indicate spoilage.

To ensure the purchase of genuine honey, consumers are advised to buy from trusted brands or local beekeepers. Labels indicating raw, unprocessed, or organic honey pro-

vide additional assurance of authenticity. Avoiding honey that appears excessively smooth, watery, or overly clear can also help in identifying ultra-processed variants.

As demand for honey continues to rise, awareness about these simple tests is crucial in helping consumers make informed decisions. By adopting these methods, individuals can ensure they are consuming high-quality, unadulterated honey that retains its natural benefits.

Don Makes Case for Constitutional Review to Improve Access to Healthcare in Nigeria

The need for regulatory laws governing surrogacy, assisted reproductive treatments, mental health, emergencies and other issues is imperative to improve access to healthcare in Nigeria

Babcock University don and award-winning scholar, Prof. Cheluchi Onyemelukwe-Onuobia made this declaration while delivering the 52nd inaugural lecture of Babcock University.

According to her, "Laws and their implementation can become a stumbling block if not properly addressed,"

Citing the case of the criminalization of attempted suicide, she noted that this was a legacy of old law from the era of British colonization, which has long been changed in the United Kingdom.

Although she said some states had made adjustments over the years in this area, she admitted that there was a need to do more to improve the health sector

She also noted that regulatory laws were necessary

to protect the rights and interests of all parties involved, including surrogates, intended parents, and children.

"Regulations can ensure that surrogacy and assisted reproductive treatments are carried out safely and ethically and prevent the exploitation of vulnerable individuals."

Prof. Onyemelukwe-Onuobiaidentified key challenges in Nigeria's health sector, including the high burden of disease, maternal mortality, limited access to healthcare, inadequate human resources and health budget allocation.

"Budgetary allocations to healthcare hover between 5% or less of the annual budget, falling short of providing best standards for a population of almost a quarter of a billion," she lamented.

To address these challenges, Prof. Onyemelukwe-Onuobia recommended among others, the review and updating of outdated laws to reflect modern values and human rights standards;

SEC Alerts Public on Unregistered Investment Schemes

The Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) has issued a warning to the public regarding unregistered investment schemes, including Promiseland Estates Limited and Promiseland Building & Construction Limited, which are behind an illegal investment initiative known as Pro-Vest.

In a statement released on Friday, the commission expressed concern over the operations of these entities, highlighting that they misrepresent themselves as investment advisers and fund managers within the Nigerian capital market.

"The commission hereby

informs the investing public that Promiseland Estates Limited and Promiseland Building & Construction Limited lack the necessary registration to operate in any capacity within the Nigerian capital market," the SEC stated.

Additionally, the commission warned against investing in My Share, which is operated by UYJ Multitrade Limited, as it similarly claims to be an investment adviser and fund manager without proper authorization.

The SEC strongly advised investors to avoid engaging with these entities or their representatives, stressing that dealing with unregulated firms carries significant risks, including fraud and

financial losses.

"The investing public is urged to verify the registration status of any company or entity offering investment opportunities through the Commission's dedicated portal before committing funds," the statement added.

Furthermore, the SEC cautioned against engaging in investment transactions with Risevest (Victoria Island) Cooperative Multipurpose Society Limited and Stecs (Alausa) Multipurpose Cooperative Society, commonly referred to as Stecs, emphasizing that neither of these organizations is registered or authorized to operate within the Nigerian capital market.

The company's board has proposed a final dividend of N2.00 per share, representing a dividend yield of 4.8% based on the closing price of N41.80 per share as of March 4.

Despite the challenging macroeconomic environment, NASCON sustained profitability and delivered earnings growth. The company's gross margin declined due to higher cost of raw materials and manufacturing expenses, but its net finance income improved due to increased interest income





BUA Cement posts 6.4% rise in earnings, proposes NGN2.05 dividend per share

UA Cement Plc has announced its 2024 audited financial results, reporting a 6.4% yearon-year growth in earnings per share (EPS) to N2.18. The company's revenue surged by 90.5% year-on-year to N876.47 billion, driven by upward price adjustments and higher sales volumes.

Despite the robust revenue

growth, the company's gross margin declined by 707 basis points year-on-year to 37.1%, due to higher energy costs and operation and maintenance service charges. However, the company's profit before tax (PBT) increased by 48.2% year-on-year to NGN99.63 billion, driven by the strong revenue growth.

The company's board has

proposed a final dividend of N2.05 per share, representing a dividend yield of 2.2% based on the closing price of N93.00 per share as of February 28.

Looking ahead to 2025, analysts expect sustained revenue growth and EBITDA margin expansion driven by increased demand and higher contributions from new plants.

Seplat reports increased production from newly acquired Mobil asset

in total production following the acquisition of Mobil Producing Nigeria Unlimited (MPNU), now renamed Seplat Energy Producing Nigeria Unlimited (SEPNU).

This was disclosed in the company's audited financial results for the year ended December 31, 2024.

According to the report, Seplat's onshore assets averaged 48,618 barrels of oil equivalent per day (boepd) in 2024, a 2% increase from 47,758 boepd recorded in

The integration of SEPNU contributed an annualized average of $% \left\{ \mathbf{r}^{\prime}\right\} =\mathbf{r}^{\prime}$ 4,329 kboepd, pushing total production to 52,947 boepd.

Following the acquisition, Seplat's independently audited 2P reserves rose by 85% to 886 million barrels of oil equivalent (MMboe), upfrom 478 MMboein 2023.

The company's total 2P+2C reserves also increased by 125% to 1,217 MMboe, reinforcing its position as a leading player in Nigeria's energy sector.

Seplat Energy recorded key perational achievements in 2024. including the resumption of 24hour operations on the Trans Niger Pipeline (TNP) in Q4.

This development drove a 60% year-on-year increase in oil production from OML 53 due to improved export availability.

The company also commissioned the Sapele Integrated Gas Plant (IGP) in Q4 2024, with commercial gas sales set to commence inearly 2025.

Additionally, the ANOH gas plant is on track to test with thirdparty dry gas in H1 2025, while tunneling operations on the OB3 pipeline resumed in Q12025.

Seplat Energy's revenue grew by 5% to \$1.116 billion in 2024, up

eplat Energy Plc has from \$1.061 billion in 2023, with reported an 11% increase contributions from SEPNU.

Underlying adjusted revenue remained stable at \$961 million.

However, cash generated from operations dropped 26% to \$384 million due to timing of liftings, one-off costs from the SEPNU acquisition, and working capital adjustments.

The company ended the year with \$469.9 million in cash at the bank, excluding \$132.2 million in restricted cash.

However, net debt increased to \$898 million from \$306 million in 2023, reflecting the financial impact of the acquisition.

Following the completion of the SEPNU acquisition, the asset has delivered strong production performance, averaging 81.1 kboepd since integration, with a full-year average working interest production of 69.4 kboepd.

For 2025, Seplat Energy has set a production target of 120-140 kboepd, with Seplat Onshore expected to contribute 48-56 kboepd and SEPNU forecasted at 72-84 kboepd.

Initial capital expenditure (capex) guidance is between \$260 million and \$320 million, covering investments in 13 new onshore wells and offshore projects, including the replacement of an inlet gas exchanger on the East Area Project (EAP) NGL project.

The company expects unit operating costs to rise slightly to \$14.0-15.0/boe in 2025, with a focus on maintenance and integrity activities at SEPNU. Efforts will also be directed at reopening shut-in wells and accelerating an infill drilling campaign to sustain long-term production growth.

Seplat Energy's Chief Executive Officer, Roger Brown, described 2024 as a defining year for the company, emphasizing the importance of the SEPNU acquisition.





MTN's N400 billion loss in 2024: When is profit coming back?

TN Nigeria has reported a N400 ery. The company's official outlook reflects this confidence: loss in 2024, marking a significant financial setback.

For a company that was once a favorite among investors, this downturn raises pressing questions about when profitability will return and whether shareholders can $expect\ dividends\ any time\ soon.$

MTN's 2024 financial results reflect a perfect storm of macroeconomic headwinds, rising finance costs, and foreign exchange losses.

However, the company has outlined a recovery strategy, one that hinges on tariff adjustments, cost efficiency, and financial restructuring. But will it be enough?

MTN's troubles in 2024 were rooted in a combination of macroeconomic headwinds and internal cost pressures:

Soaring costs: Despite strong revenue growth, operating expenses surged, weighing heavily on profitability. EBITDA margin dropped by 9.6% to 39.1%.

Foreign exchange losses: The naira devaluation wiped out N925 billion from MTN's books, turning what could have been a profitable year into a record loss.

Rising Finance Costs: Even ross aept aeciinea to N972.9 billion (from N1.18 trillion), finance costs jumped due to increased lease interest expenses from MTN's revised tower lease agreements.

"Our financial performance was significantly impacted by the challenging operating envi-ronment, particularly currency devaluation and rising interest

Even with a strong revenue growth of 36% to N3.3 trillion, the surge in costs wiped out profitability, turning share-holders' funds to a negative of N458 billion,

Faced with these challenges, MTN believes that a combination of a 50% tariff hike, cost reductions, and financial restructuring gives it

"The recent approvals of new tariffs by the regulator will enable us to sustain the required investments in our networks, which are needed to enhance customer experience and industry sustainability.

It further highlighted several additional measures taken to navigate its financial challenges beyond the tariff hike.

In its official statements, the company detailed strategies aimed at stabilizing operations and returning to profitability, including the following:

Renegotiating Tower Lease Agreements: Adjusting con-tracts with IHS led to N113.8 billion in operational cost savings, improving EBITDA mar-

Reducing FX exposure: The company aggressively cut its outstanding US-dollar liabilities from \$416.6 million to \$20.8 million, minimizing currence and the state of the state rency volatility risks.

Expense efficiency initiatives: Implementing costcutting measures saved N41.9 billion in 2024.

Optimizing Capital Expenditure: MTN deployed N443.5 billion in capex, lowering its intensity to 13.2% from 18.2% in 2023, ensuring more efficient capital allocation.

The company is now projecting the following for 2025:

Service revenue growth of at least 45%.

EBITDA margin recovery to at least mid-40%.

A full reversal from negative shareholders' equity.

Additionally, over the medium term, the company aims to achieve the following:

Service revenue growth of at EBITDA margin of at least

A normalization of capex

intensity Using 2024 as a baseline, a 50% tariff hike could push MTN's key financials to a more

positive trajectory: Revenue: If service revenue grows by 45%, MTN's top line could rise to N4.8 trillion in

EBITDA: With an expected

mid-40% margin, EBITDA could rebound to N2.2 trillion, a significant improvement from N1.3 trillion in 2024.

Net Profit: Assuming cost pressures ease and FX losses stabilize, MTN could swing back to profitability, with a projected PAT of N500–N600 bilion a sharp turnaround from lion, a sharp turnaround from 2024's deep losses.

MTN's turnaround plan is ambitious, but execution remains key. The 50% tariff hike, cost reductions, and financial restructuring offer a pathway back to profitability.

However, macroeconomic volatility, exchange rate risks, and consumer price sensitivity remain critical uncertainties that could derail recovery

The biggest tailwind here is the 50% tariff hike, but the crit-ical unknown remains price elasticity. Will Nigerians continue purchasing data and air-time at higher prices, or will they cut back?

Rising unemployment and stagnant wages could limit discretionary spending.

Intensifying competition, particularly from Airtel, Glo, and 9Mobile, pressuring market share and pricing power.

If demand declines sharply, MTN's revenue projections could fall short, it may worsen its financial position and recov

MTN's share price has shown resilience, recovering from a 24% YtD loss in 2024 to a 32% gain by February 2025, ranking it 23rd on the NGX.

This signals renewed investor confidence, but for how

Overall, for now, MTN remains a high-risk, highreward stock. Investors will need to weigh short-term market volatility against long-term growth potential.

The next few quarters will be crucial in assessing whether MTN's strategy is robust enough to restore profitability and deliver value to sharehold-



ransnational Corporation Plc (Transcorp) has published its financial results for the year ending December 31, 2024, reporting a pre-tax profit of N136.6 billion.

This marks an impressive 132.41% increase from the N58.8 billion reported the previous year, buoyed by a substantial rise in reve-

The group recorded total revenue of N407.9 billion, a 107.07% increase from N196.9 billion in 2023, with 'power' contributing a significant 82.8% of the total.

However, revenue for the company experienced a 10.08% decline, dropping from N16 billion the previous year to N14.4 billion in

Pre-tax profit for the company surged to N18.4 billion, representing an impressive 90.74% increase, while profit from core operations climbed to N25.1 billion, a notable rise of 64.52% from N15.2 billion.

Total assets for the group surged to N751.5 billion, reflecting a 41.82% increase from the previous year's N529.9 billion. Additionally, retained earnings grew by 62.96%, reaching N112.3 billion, up from N68.9 billion.

Total comprehensive income attributable to the owners stood at N55.4 billion, with N42.5 billion for non-controlling interests, totaling

In the previous period, the income was N41.1 billion, comprising N25 billion for owners and N16 billion for non-controlling interests.

Transcorp also proposed a Final Dividend of 60 kobo per ordinary share, pending shareholder approval and applicable withholding tax, to be paid to shareholders registered by March 27, 2025.

Combined with the Interim Dividend of 40 kobo paid on August 7, 2024, the Total Dividend for the 2024 financial year will amount to N1.00 per ordinary share.

Commenting on the results, the President and Group Chief Executive Officer of Transcorp, Mrs. Owen D. Omogiafo, stated, "Our 2024 financial performance reflects the sustainable value creation strategy of Transcorp Group. We have consistently recorded impressive growth across all indices year on year, despite the challenging macroeconomic environment."

Transcorp reported a substantial increase in revenue, rising by 107.07% to N407.9 billion from N196.9 billion in the previous year.

Revenue from 'power' made up 82.8% of this total at N337.7 billion, while 'hospitality' contributed 17.2%, amounting to N70.1 billion.

However, the group's cost of sales also increased significantly, up 141.62% to N212.2 billion compared to N87.8 billion last year.

Natural gas and fuel costs accounted for 80.1% of total costs, reaching N170 billion.


Despite the higher costs, the group reported a gross profit of N195.6 billion, which is a 79.27% increase from N109.1 billion announced in the prior year.





Costs Review without Wide Consultation Is Unfair

igeria has become a country with inexplicably choking taxes and tariffs amidst economic crisis. Every day, rashes of fiscal and monetary policies are churned out by the Federal government to stabilize the obviously wobbling economy. The abrupt removal of prices of petroleum products in 2023 without adequate palliative measures to cushion its negative impacts paved the way for sharp increases in costs of goods and services in the country. The endorsed new minimum wage bill which affects about 30% of the nation's workforce till date has not been able to substantially improve the earnings of the populace It is against this backdrop that we condemn the arbitrarily upward review of charges and tariffs imposed on the citizenry.by the government agencies and services providers.

machines (ATMs) and Point Of Sale (POS). The unfair review took effect from March 1, 2025 in spite of litigation against the apex bank by the Socioeconomic Rights and Accountability Project (SERAP). The unavailability of these banks in rural areas and usual network glitches make resort to POS inevitable This means that Nigerians would be forced to spend about #1000 for #20,000 transactions made through the POS as the ATMs remain grossly inadequate The CBN's financial inclusion policy may be jeopardised if the prospective bank customers choose to save their earnings under their pillars at the risk of burglars.

IWD: WOFAN empowers 54,000 women in agromarketing with rice distribution initiative

o mark the 2025 International Women's Day (IWD), the Women Farmers Advancement Network (WOFAN) has launched a transformative initiative aimed at boosting the economic prospects of 54,000 underserved women in agro-marketing. The initiative, under WOFAN's Mini Project, is specifically designed to support widows and street food vendors by bridging gaps in the agricultural value chain and fostering financial inclusion.

Speaking at the event in <u>Kano</u>, WOFAN-ICON2 Country Director, Dr. Salamatu Garba, emphasized the need for tangible action over rhetoric.

"We must go beyond just talking and take meaningful steps to uplift women by giving them confidence, opportunities, and economic independence," she stated.

At the core of this initiative is the distribution of 54,000 bags of rice to small-scale female traders, many of whom typically sell less than half a portion of rice daily across nine targeted states. To ensure efficient distribution, the rice will be delivered in three separate batches.

"By providing this support, WOFAN aims to enhance their business potential, allowing them to expand and diversify their income streams," Dr. Garba explained.

The initiative aligns with the Mastercard Foundation's mission to create 10 million dignified job opportunities in Africa by 2030, including one million for Nigerian youths aged 18-35.

Beyond rice distribution, WOFAN is integrating beneficiaries into the entire rice value chain—connecting producers, processors, aggregators, miniagro marketers, and logistics providers through WOFAN's mini logistics riders initiative.

Traditional leaders, group representatives, and elders present at the event urged recipients to leverage their training and financial inclusion opportunities to grow their businesses.

A key component of WOFAN's



empowerment model is its newly launched mini logistics project, designed to streamline produce transportation and enhance market access.

Dr. Garba explained WOFAN's closed-loop system:

"Farmers receive essential inputs like fertilizer and seeds. They cultivate and harvest their crops. Women at WOFAN's processing centers refine the rice using modern equipment. The processed rice is then redistributed to smallholder farmers and traders to stimulate business growth.'

By addressing gaps in agricultural logistics and empowering women to take ownership of the value chain, WOFAN is demonstrating what accelerated action looks like.

"This initiative goes beyond aid—it is a sustainable model that strengthens every segment of the agricultural process," she added.

Women are encouraged to reinvest their earnings in other businesses such as egg sales, grinding mills, and vegeta-

Recognizing the financial exclusion that has long hindered women in business, WOFAN has facilitated financial training in negotiation, marketing, and digital sales, equipping women with essential skills.

"In partnership with UBA and other financial institutions, we have opened 90,000 bank accounts for underprivileged women, enabling them to access ATM cards and engage in seamless cashless transactions," Dr. Garba

To further support financial security, WOFAN introduced POS systems in marketplaces, ensuring smooth payment processes for traders.

"This is not just about distributing rice; it's about creating an ecosystem where women can build sustainable livelihoods and gain economic independence," she concluded.

Professor Sani Miko, Chair of WOFAN's Technical Advisory Board, highlighted the initiative's inclusivity:

'WOFAN is working to target 675,000 farmers and processors in the next five years. However, we discovered that agro-marketers—an essential link in the agricultural value chain—are often left out. This initiative ensures they are included and supported."

He praised Dr. Garba's unwavering dedication, urging beneficiaries to pray for her during the holy month of Ramadan.

"Every time she calls me, the first thing she asks is, 'Professor, what more can we do to help people?' That is always our conversation. Finding a woman like her is rare," he said.

Khadija Dogon Bauchi expressed gratitude for Dr. Garba's relentless efforts:

"She has been a pillar of support for women like us, ensuring that we have better job opportunities and financial stability. We are truly grateful."

Butchers seek FG's intervention as cow price skyrockets to N2m

he Lagos State Butchers' Association has lamented the soaring cost of cows threatening the livelihoods of its members and called for the Federal Government's intervention to save the sector from an imminent collapse.

The association's Chairman, Taiwo Rasak, disclosed this in an interview on Sunday in Lagos.

Rasak said the persistent surge in

cow prices had pushed Lagos butchers to the brink with many struggling to maintain profit margins and stay in

"At the moment, the cheapest cow you can get is N700,000 against N200,000 to N350,000.

"Some cows are as high as N2,000,000 now depending on the

"It is going to be more expensive



now that we are in the Ramadan season," Rasak said.

He said the development had led to reduced profit margins with many butchers battling to survive, while some could shut down their businesses if the situation persists.

"The impact of rising cow prices on Lagos butchers cannot be overstated. Many are struggling to survive and some may be forced to shut down their businesses if the situation doesn't

The usually vibrant Oja Awolowo Market here in Mushin has fallen quiet with meat sellers facing a dire shortage that left their stalls nearly bare.

While I acknowledge the government's efforts to improve the lives of Lagos butchers, I urge them to swiftly address the mounting challenges in the sector that demand a more rapid and effective response," he said.

Rasak described the government's funding of meat production as the needed vital investment in the livestock sector.

He said the support would enable butchers and farmers to remain in business, even in the face of skyrocketing

"The interventions can help bridge the gap between supply and demand, ultimately benefiting consumers.

"By supporting meat production, the government can contribute to food security, economic growth, and the well-being of its citizens.

"To effectively alleviate the challenges faced by meat sellers, the government must ensure that palliative loans are disbursed efficiently to reach the intended beneficiaries.

Those who genuinely require financial support to sustain their businesses must be sought after.

"It is crucial that the government establishes a transparent and equitable system for distributing palliative loans, guaranteeing that these funds are directed towards meat sellers who are struggling to cope with the rising costs and need assistance to stay afloat," he







National Arts Theatre Revamp Poised to Unlock \$25 Billion in Creative Economy - *Cardoso*

overnor of the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN), Yemi Cardoso, has highlighted the potential of Nigeria's creative industry to generate up to \$25 billion, emphasizing the role of the newly renovated National Arts Theatre in driving this growth.

Speaking during a visit to the Lagosbased facility on Thursday, he praised the transformation of the historic venue and its significance in unlocking economic opportunities within the creative sector.

The renovation, which began in July 2021 following federal approval, involved extensive upgrades to various sections of the theatre. The main performance hall, banquet hall, exhibition spaces, and multiple cinemas were modernized. Additional enhancements

included the installation of an industrial kitchen, a fire station, a clinic, new restroom facilities, upgraded entrance lobbies, and comprehensive roof repairs. These improvements are aimed at elevating the theatre to world-class standards, making it a key player in Nigeria's cultural and creative economy.



Silencing Women? Natasha Saga Overshadows IWD, Conversation Continues

The Federal Government on Friday said it would intervene in the leadership crisis of the National Assembly after the suspension of the senator representing Kogi Central Senatorial District, Natasha Akpoti-Uduaghan.

"We're engaging all the stakeholders to ensure that they temper justice with mercy," the Minister of Women Affairs, Mrs. Iman Suleiman-Ibrahim, told State House correspondents during the Meetthe-Press Programme at the Presidential Villa, Abuja.

Her comments came barely 24 hours after the 10th Senate suspended Natasha for six months.

The lawmaker had submitted a petition alleging she had been sexually harassed by the Senate President, Godswill Akpabio.

Natasha first raised the alarm on February 28.

However, the Senate dismissed her petition on procedural grounds as the ethics committee recommended her suspension, saying she had brought ridicule to the upper chamber.

Reacting to the development, the women affairs minister said, "It's an unfortunate incident that should not happen. In the last Assembly, we had nine senators who were women.

"We don't want to lose any woman member in the Senate or decrease in number.

"We're going to be brokering peace. We'll engage all the stakeholders to ensure that they temper justice with mercy."

Suleiman-Ibrahim said she was emboldened by the Senate President's openness to talk.

"I was at the National Assembly yesterday, at the Senate where we marked the International Women's Day.

"The last thing the Senate president said was that 'we're open to broker peace.'

"So, we're going to be the intermediary between the two parties to see that we broker peace; for peace to reign, and then we'll continue to sensitize everyone so that we learn to work better together as women and men."

Coalition Threatens Showdown: But some women groups on Friday rejected the suspension of Natasha, describing it as an assault on democracy and a deliberate attempt to silence women in leadership.



The groups include a coalition under the Coalition for Women in Governance and the Women in Management, Business, and Public Service.

The coalition threatened to mobilize women for a massive protest if the decision was not reversed.

Addressing journalists in Abuja on Friday, one of the coalition leaders, Zainab Mohammed, condemned the Senate's action, calling it a blatant disregard for the rule of law.

She noted that the suspension defied a court order explicitly halting any disciplinary action against Natasha, making the move illegal and a direct attack on democratic principles.

Mohammed said, "The Senate's decision is not just an injustice against one woman; it is an attack on the democratic rights of the people she represents. This is a dangerous precedent that sends a message to every Nigerian who dares to challenge power."

She demanded the immediate reinstatement of Natasha and called on the Senate to respect judicial authority by reversing its decision.

"The true test of democracy is not in words but in action. We will not stand by while democracy is undermined. We will take to the streets if necessary to ensure justice prevails," she added.

The President and Founder of the Pan African Young

Women Development Initiative, Dr. Jophia Gupar, stated that the issue transcended Natasha as an individual and affected all women.

She criticized the three female senators for failing to support Natasha.

Gupar said, "It is not about Natasha; it is about Nigerian women. The implication of what these senators are doing is discouraging our women from speaking out when they are harassed.

"I feel sorry for the three other women in the Senate. If they like, let them keep quiet, but what you sow is what you will reap. These senators should know they have daughters. There is the law of karma."

"So, we're going to be the intermediary between the two parties to see that we broker peace; for peace to reign, and then we'll continue to sensitize everyone so that we learn to work better together as women and men."

WIMBIZ also demanded that the authorities should take action on the suspension of Natasha.

In a statement on Friday, the association expressed concerns about the incident, which it said highlighted the ongoing challenges faced by women in leadership across Nigeria.

WIMBIZ said, "First, we are troubled by reports of Senator Natasha Akpoti-Uduaghan—a female senator facing severe institutional pushback after raising concerns about misconduct. She has not been given a fair hearing, and no investigation has been conducted as far as public knowledge is concerned. But she has been met with punitive measures that effectively silence her and compromise her ability to serve."

While demanding action, the association called for a fair hearing for Natasha.

WIMBIZ said as the world marks International Women's Day on Saturday, under the theme 'Accelerate Action,' there was a need for urgent action toward achieving gender equality, addressing the slow pace of progress, and empowering women and girls worldwide.

13,000 Sign Petition Against Akpabio: Meanwhile, over 13,000 supporters of Natasha have called on Akpabio to step down for investigation.

The petition, which started on Wednesday on change.org, had gathered 13,046 signatures as of the time of filing this report on Friday.

The originator of the petition, the Purple Women Foundation, founded by Ireti Bakare-Yusuf, demanded justice for Natasha.

"We, the Purple Women Foundation, demand that Senate President Godswill Akpabio steps down immediately to allow for a fair and unbiased investigation into the sexual harassment allegations made by Senator Natasha Akpoti-Uduaghan!

"Immediate stepping down of Senate President Godswill Akpabio, transparent and impartial investigation and justice and accountability: for survivors of sexual harassment, let's come together to demand justice and create a safe and respectful environment for all," it read.

Akpabio's Kinsmen Seek Natasha's Recall: In a related development, some kinsmen of the Senate President, under the umbrella body of Afe Annang, a foremost socio-cultural organization of the Annang nation in Akwa Ibom State, said the sixmonth suspension of the Kogi Central senator was not enough punishment.

The group said Natasha denigrated the Senate by her behavior.

While speaking with journalists during a media interaction in Abak Local Government Area of Akwa Ibom State on Thursday, the Itai Afe Annang, His Majesty Obong Blaise Awakama, who was flanked by other elders of the Annang extraction, said the embattled senator should be recalled by her constituents.

"We are not satisfied with only suspension; I think she should be recalled by her constituents and advised properly.

"I don't think that type of conduct, any Nigerian, let alone a woman, should carry it to the Senate. It's not enough to be suspended, I think her constituents should recall and give her proper advice and orientation and be replaced by some other person," he said.


Emphasizing that every ethnic group is represented in the Senate, the elders warned that no female senator should be used as a front to defame the Senate President.

They warned against any plot to remove Akpabio from office, adding that they would not fold their arms to see such a plot succeed.

They also emphasized that a false claim of sexual harassment should not be used as an instrument of political harassment by political antagonists.



'Money illusion' and Tinubu's challenge to Governors

6Money illusion', in Economics, refers to the tendency of people to confuse the nominal value of money (its face value) with its real value (its purchasing power). In other words, people tend to think that a certain amount of money has the same value over time, even if the purchasing power of the money has massively decreased due to inflation

This 'illusion' has, without exception, afflicted Nigeria's entire political leadership and the officialdom in the past two years or so. President Bola Ahmed Tinubu exceptionally 'showcased' this affliction the other day during a national caucus meeting of the ruling All Progressives Congress (APC) at the state house, Abuja.

President Tinubus pecifically told the state governors at the meeting that Federal allocations to their states have tripled under his administration. "If your state was receiving N40 billion before, you are now getting N120 billion," the president said with aplomb. He ascribed the quantum increase in distributable funds among the three tiers of government (Federal, State, and Local) to savings' from fuel subsidy removal and other sources.

Tinubu went on to challenge the state governors to do more in their developmental strides in their various domains, since they now have more money in their hands. The President also urged the citizenry to refocus their expectations and requests to the subnational governments, rather than piling up pressure only on the Federal Government.

No doubt, really, that the quantum of revenue shared by the Federation Account Allocation Committee (FAAC) monthly among the three tiers of government has risen substantially (in nominal terms) under the Tinubu administration. Exactly ten years ago, in February 2015, FAAC shared only N500 billion among the three tiers of government; in February 2019, the sum of N660.37 billion was disbursed.

In March 2024, FAAC shared a total of N1.123 trillion, from a gross total revenue of N1.867 trillion. In December 2024, FAAC shared N1.424 trillion, from a gross total of N2.310 trillion, to the three tiers of government.

But as the distributable amount by FAAC was increasing, from hundreds of billions of naira as of 2015 and 2019 (as shown above) to trillions by 2024, inflation and exchange rates maintained a similar pattern. While the rate of inflation was at single digit level of 8.4 per cent in February 2015, by December 2024, it had hit 34.80 per cent—an almost five times rise in about ten years.

Similarly, while in February 2015, the naira to dollar exchange rate was N198/USS, by end-December 2024, the rate was N1,535/USS. This is about eight times crash in value of naira during the period. Even in the nearer term of May 2023, the average exchange rate of the naira per US dollar (in the official window) was about N460/USS, but deteriorated to N1535/US as of end-December 2024.

From another perspective, while the price of fuel (Premium Motor Spirit, PMS) was about N185/liter as of May 2023, by end-December 2024, the price was over N1000/liter—a jump of N815 per liter in just 20 months. So, what one could buy at less than N200 in 2023, by 2024, he has to pay over N1000 to buy the same item. Simple!

Again, in the first half of 2023, the price of a 50kg bag of cement (of various makes) was about N2000—N3000, but at present, the price hovers around N10,000. So have the prices of other building materials gone up. The same pattern applies to food items: rice, beans, onions, yam, maize, cocoyam, cassava, name it.



So, what is the worth of the trillions of naira being shared by FAAC? In the states, depending on the location, the developmental projects that could be executed with the few billions of naira a few years ago, can no longer be done with the hundreds of billions being received from FAAC today.

In real terms, therefore, all tiers of government in Nigeria have been getting poorer in the past 20 months. After all, the Nobel laureate in Economics, John Maynard Keynes says that the value of money is determined by what it can buy, rather than by any intrinsic value it may possess. Also, another renowned Economist, Milton Freidman says "The importance of the value of money is not the value itself, but the purchasing power it represents."

What purchasing power does the naira represent today? This is why the Organized Labor (Nigeria Labor Congress & Co.) got the short end of the stick, when they took the N70,000 minimum wage. No sooner they signed the deal with the Federal Government than they realized that they had shot themselves in the foot. Labor was focusing on nominal wage increases rather than real wage increases.

Seventy thousand naira is only worth what it can buy: not up to one 50kg of any brand of rice in any Nigerian market. Today, few months after the minimum wage deal, Labor has practically gone back to the trenches—fighting for more increases in (minimum) wage.

The 'money illusion' is also best illustrated in the fact that between 2024 and 2025, the Federal Government had to double its budget. While Nigeria's total budget for 2024 was N27.5 trillion, the one for 2025 stands at N54.99 trillion. This doubling of the size of the budget just in a space of one year is unprecedented; it vividly shows how fast the purchasing power of the naira is crashing.

In 2022, Nigeria's total budget was N17 trillion, and in 2023, it was N21.82 trillion—a modest difference of N3.82 trillion between the two years. But between 2024 and 2025, the figure doubled! This 'ballooned' figure gives the gullible public the impression of a good public finance outlook, and a false sense of comfort.

It goes without saying, however, that 'money illusion' exerts a number of negative effects on an economy, including the distorted impression of 'abundance' of money. It leads to poor financial decisions by all economic agents—as they cannot accurately take into account the effects of inflation on their money.

'Money illusion' leads to sub-optimal allocation of resources, as people invest in assets that appear to have high nominal returns but low real returns. Thus, even as the Federal Government of Nigeria (FGN) Treasury Bills issued by the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) have been at (high) yields of 20-22 per cent, their real returns are negative. This is because the subsisting rate of inflation remains much higher.

At virtually all levels, many developmental initiatives have turned 'white elephant projects' or totally abandoned due to the crashing purchasing power of annual budgetary provisions year-in-year-out. Government officials merely move around bandying the humongous sums in billions and trillions that have been 'spent' on various projects.

Although there are several other factors that contribute to the abandonment of projects, the fast crashing real value of budgetary allocations remains critical. The hyperinflationary trend in Nigeria, triggered by fuel subsidy removal, and the full floatation of the naira which led to its sudden massive devaluation have combined to make projects planning and execution traumatic.

Distorted budget cycle, now entrenched by the Tinubu administration, has come to worsen the uncertainty created by 'money illusion.' Rather than having the annual budget run from January to December, the cycle has now also turned unpredictable under the current administration. This has resulted into several reviews of projects (with contract sums rising), and rolling them over through many (annual) budgets. And many of the projects are eventually abandoned!

Beyond propaganda, however, does the Government really have so much money for its programs and activities? If the Government has so much money (as the trillions of naira shows), why is it going cap in hand, borrowing money from everywhere across the globe? Why is the Government imposing all manner of taxes, duties and levies on (mostly hitherto free) public goods, services and utilities?

As the purchasing power of the citizenry is fast crashing, courtesy of rising inflation, Government directly or through its agencies keeps hiking existing tax rates or imposing new ones. For instance, in the contentious tax bill before the National Assembly, the Value Added Tax (VAT) rate is being raised from 7.5 per cent to 10 per cent. Being a consumption tax, hike in VAT rate automatically translates to 'milking' the consumer the more.

'Money illusion' has, in a way, led the CBN to construe the ravaging hyperinflationary trend in the country as a monetary phenomenon, where 'too much money is chasing few goods'. Yet, the runaway inflation is more of a 'cost push' problem, because of the rising cost of all productive activities—including 'imported components' of such costs.

The apex bank believed there has been an excess of money in circulation, leading to increased demand for a 'limited' supply of goods and services. With this as a background, the CBN has been taking a tight monetary stance, including raising the Monetary Policy Rate (MPR) to highest level in recent years: from 18 per cent in June 2023 to 27.50 per cent at end-2024. An almost 10 per cent hike in 18 months.

The CBN also raised the Cash Reserve Ratio (CRR) to 'drain' cash from the commercial banks, and weaken their credit creation capacity. But this, plus the high MPR, raised the cost of credit to private sector operators—and indeed, pushed loans beyond the reach of most businesses—especially the Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (SMEs).

Apparently ensconced in the so-muchmoney backdrop, the CBN has been issuing bonds and Treasury Bills at mouthwatering rates—attracting both local and foreign portfolio investors (FPIs)—all to the detriment of the real sector in the country. The FPIs, as 'hot money' have been flying in and out of the country at indeterminate paces, and sustaining the macroeconomic volatility.

Apart from the CBN, almost without exception, all other Federal Government agencies have continued to impose or hike charges for their services to the populace. And they are being celebrated for the trillions of naira they are raking in for the Government. Nigeria Custom Service (NCS), Nigeria Immigration Service (NIS), Nigerian Ports Authority (NPA), among others, have been exceeding their revenue targets'—leaving the citizenry poorer.

These huge (unexpected) revenues from these agencies, as explained by President Tinubu, were what moved him to go back to the National Assembly for a top-up to the 2025 Appropriation Bill, as it was undergoing legislative consideration. This unusual step shows that Mr. President believes that the bigger the money budgeted, the more 'successful' the budget would be. And we ask: where are the impacts of the previous budgets?

So, rather than flaunting the 'fat' FAAC monthly allocations, the Federal Government should begin to address the root causes of the crashing purchasing power. Why has inflation been rising, and remained high even after the rebasing of the Consumer Price Index (CPI)?

After rebasing, the CPI—which measures inflation rate—was brought down from end-2024 level of 34.80 per cent to 24.48 per cent in January 2025. The rebasing which amounted to a mere change in the methodology used by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS), led to the 'drop' in the CPI value.

It will therefore be another type of illusion for the Federal Government to begin to celebrate the so-called drop in inflation rate. After all, the 24.48 per cent for January 2025 is far above the sub-Saharan Africa average of five per cent ('Africa Pulse' report) in 2024. And, in the advanced economies (UK and US, for instance), inflation rate is hardly above three per cent.

In dealing with the 'money illusion' challenge, therefore, the ball is squarely in the court of the Federal Government. This is because whatever is the state of the Nigerian economy today is largely policy-induced: mainly unintended upshots. So, let's begin to getreal!
