CBN Holds Steady: Is 27.5% MPR the Inflation Cure?

n a move that signals a continued commitment to its tight monetary policy stance, the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) has once again held its benchmark Monetary Policy Rate (MPR) at 27.50 percent. This decision, reached unanimously by the Monetary Pol-

icy Committee (MPC) at its 301st meeting on July 21st and 22nd, marks the seventh consecutive time the rate has been retained, raising a critical question across the nation: Is this unwavering approach truly the cure for Nigeria's persistent inflation?

The CBN's primary objective in maintaining the MPR, alongside other key

Reserve Ratio (CRR) at 50% for Deposit Money Banks, is to "sustain the momentum of disinflation and sufficiently contain price pressures." The Committee acknowledged a third consecutive monthly decline in headline inflation, which eased to 22.22 percent in June 2025 from 22.97 percent in May. This moderation CBN to a decrease in energy prices and a notable stability in the foreign exchange market, bolstered by improved capital flows and increased crude oil production.

However, the picture isn't entirely rosy. While the year-on-year headline inflation saw a dip, the month-on-month figure nudged

parameters like the Cash was largely attributed by the upwards to 1.68 percent from 1.53 percent, suggesting that underlying price pressures, particularly from services and imported food, remain a concern. Food inflation also saw an uptick, rising to 21.97 percent in June from 21.14 percent in May, primarily due to increased costs of processed food.

Experts Weigh In: A Divided Outlook

The CBN's steadfastness has drawn mixed reactions from economic analysts and stakeholders.

Dr. Aisha Bello, a Senior Economist at a leading financial institution, expressed cautious optimism. "The CBN's consistency is crucial. In a volatile global economic landscape, maintaining a stable MPR provides predictability and signals a clear commitment to price stability," she stated. "The decline in head-line inflation, coupled with the impressive 3.13 percent



real GDP growth in Q1 2025 and the rise in external reserves to over \$40 billion, indicates that the current policies are yielding some positive results. This sustained tight stance is necessary to anchor inflationary expectations and consolidate the gains made so far." She further highlighted the stability in the banking sector, with eight banks already meeting recapitalization requirements, as a sign of financial system resilience.

Conversely, Mr. Emeka Okoro, an independent economic commentator, voiced a more skeptical view. "While we appreciate the CBN's efforts, the month-on-month increase in inflation and the persistent rise in food prices are red flags," Okoro argued. "Holding the MPR constant might prevent further acceleration, but is it actively 'curing' the inflation, especially for the average Nigerian grappling with high cost of living? Many Nigerians, as a recent CBN survey showed, are actually hoping for a reduction in interest rates to ease access to credit and stimulate economic activity." He suggested that while monetary policy is vital, structural issues impacting food production and supply chains also need more aggressive government intervention to truly bring down prices.

The foreign exchange market's sustained stability and the increase in nonoil exports were cited by the CBN as positive developments. The Naira has remained relatively stable in the unofficial market post-MPC meeting, a welcome relief for businesses and con-

As Nigeria navigates its economic path, the CBN's resolve to hold the MPR at 27.50 percent stands as a testament to its focus on price stability. However, with lingering month-on-month price pressures and a public yearning for relief, the effectiveness of this "steady hand" approach as the ultimate inflation cure remains a subject of intense debate and watchful anticipation. Only time, and the continued evolution of economic indicators, will reveal the true impact of this unwavering monetary policy.

According to Mr. Fagbemi, a prominent voice in Nigerian economic discourse, the CBN's unwavering stance on the 27.5% MPR reflects a clear com-

mitment to its primary mandate of price stability. "The data shows that headline inflåtion has indeed been on a downward trend, easing to 22.22% in June from a peak of 34.6% in late 2024," Fagbemi observes. "This indicates that the tight monetary policy has had some success in cooling demand and stabilizing the currency."

However, Fagbemi is quick to point out the significant trade-offs inherent in this aggressive approach. "While the CBN's focus on distinction is commendable, the sustained high MPR comes at a substantial cost to the real sector," he asserts. "Businesses, particularly manufacturers, are grappling with exceptionally high borrowing costs. We're seeing financing costs surge, which directly impacts their ability to invest, expand, and create jobs."

He emphasizes that Nigeria's credit environment, with rates often reaching as high as 37%, is among the most expensive globally for manufacturers. "A nation simply cannot industrialize on the back of prohibitively expensive credit," Fagbemi states, echoing concerns raised by the Manufacturers Association of Nigeria (MAN). He warns that this policy risks "suffocating the capacity of the manufacturing sector" and could lead to underutilization of industrial capacity and declining investment returns.

Fagbemi also highlights the paradox of attracting foreign portfolio investment at the expense of domestic industries. "While high interest rates may temporarily lure speculative foreign capital, they do so by undermining Nigeria's productive base," he argues. "We risk building prosperity on the back of volatility if we prioritize portfolio flows over the growth of our real economy, where sustainable jobs are created and value is added."

Furthermore, Fagbemi points to the impact on consumer spending, which hit a 17-year low in Q2 2024. "The erosion of purchasing power due to persistent inflation, even if moderating, coupled with the high cost of credit, limits consumer demand," he explains. "While a modest recovery is projected, the path to sustained growth remains uncertain under these conditions.'

Looking ahead, Mr. Fagbemi suggests that while the CBN's determination to bring inflation down to single

digits is admirable, a reevaluation of the nominal rate might no longer be as necessary as before," he opines. "The CBN should explore a more balanced approach that continues to address inflationary pressures while also fostering an environment conducive to sustainable economic growth and investment in the real sector. Dialogue with stakeholders, especially the productive sectors, is crucial to ensure that policy decisions do not inadvertently cripple the very engines of long-term economic resilience."

In conclusion, Oluwafemi Fagbemi acknowledges the CBN's success in curbing headline inflation but stresses that a 27.5% MPR, while effective in the short term, presents significant challenges to the Nigerian economy's overall health and long-term industrialization goals. The true "inflation cure," he implies, might lie in a more holistic strategy that balances price stability with robust economic activity and genu ine support for local production.

he Federal Government has rolled out an ambitious expansion of its affordable housing initiative, unveiling new Renewed Hope Cities and Estates across the country.

According to Housing Minister Arch. Ahmed Musa Dangiwa, four additional Renewed Hope Cities will be launched across the North Central, South South, North East, and South East regions, adding to the already ongoing projects in Lagos, Abuja, and Kano. Alongside these, 24 states are set to receive Renewed Hope Estates—smaller, government-subsidized housing

The Renewed Hope Cities are larger-scale urban

developments backed by private investors and aimed at middle-income earners. In contrast, the Estates are modest, government-funded communities designed to offer lower-cost housing to average Nigerians, with prices starting around? 8 million.

The Minister, while inspecting the 2,000-unit development in Kano, reiterated that key projects are on track to be delivered by August. He also assured stakeholders that funding challenges are being addressed to maintain construction momentum.

This housing drive forms part of the Tinubu administration's broader commitment to bridging Nigeria's housing gap and ensuring more citizens have access to affordable and dignified shelter.

Tinubu Requests Time to Verify ? 4tn GENCO Debt

resident Bola Tinubu has appealed to electricity generation companies (GENCOs) to grant the Federal Government more time to verify the ? 4 trillion legacy debt owed them by the Nigerian power market.

The President made the request during a meeting with the Association of Power Generation Companies at the Presidential Villa in Abuja. While acknowledging the inherited liabilities, he emphasized the need for proper verification before payments are made.

"I accept the assets and liabilities of my predecessors, but that acceptance must be based on credibility. I need to wear the audit cap of verifiability and authenticity," Tinubu said, urging the GENCOs to be patient as the government conducts a thorough audit of the claims.

Special Adviser on Energy, Olu Verheijen, said the total claims by GENCOs stood at ? 4 trillion as of April 2025, with ?1.8 trillion already verified and ?200

subsidies. She explained that the debt, which dates back to 2015, would be addressed through a proposed ?4 trillion bond once all valid claims are confirmed.

The President also appealed to banks to avoid foreclosing on indebted GENCOs, emphasizing that the sector remains vital to national progress. "Let's persevere together," he said.

Minister of Power, Adebayo Adelabu, highlighted recent improvements, including increased revenue, the signing of the Electricity billion attributed to unfunded Act 2023, and a reduction in

subsidy obligations. However, he warned that the sector is still under severe liquidity pressure and called for the President's urgent intervention to prevent collapse.

Business leaders at the meeting, including Tony Elumelu and Kola Adesina, expressed concern over the GÉNCOs' financial strain, citing risk of foreclosure and shutdowns due to outstanding debts and gas supply con-straints. Elumelu said the sector could not support national transformation without urgent financial rescue.

AfDB, ILO launch framework to ensure all sectoral investments contributes to employment

ne African Devel-opment Bank (AfDB), in collaboration with the International Labour Organization (ILO), has launched a new framework to ensure every investment across sectors in the continent, contributes to enhancing market-relevant skills, employment and entrepreneurship for youths.

The framework, called the Youth, Jobs and Skills Marker System aligns with the AfDB's newly unveiled Ten-Year Strategy, and places Africa's growing youth population at the heart of its development agenda.

It stipulates that invest-

ments across agriculture, transport, energy, water, or education, must contribute to empowering the youths, which makes it the first time a development finance institution has introduced a dedicated tool to systematically integrate youth employment and skills development into its core operations.

This move is set to foster industry-relevant training and job creation over the next decade.

Jose Manuel Romero, an economist with the World Bank's Jobs Group, emphasised the importance of viewing major developroads, infrastructure, electricity, and access to finance through the lens of job creation.

He noted that incorporating this perspective could significantly enhance the impact of such projects, particularly given the scale at which they are being implemented.

"If you introduce a jobs marker, it may be very helpful to zoom in on this topic better and also to maximise the jobs impact of the operations that you're supporting",

Court Convicts Ex-NHIS Boss For Violating Cash Transaction Limit Law, Fines Him ? 10m

he Federal High Court sitting in Ikoyi, Lagos, has convicted a former Executive Secretary of the National Health Insurance Scheme (NHIS), Olufemi Thomas, for breaching Nigeria's cash transaction limit law.

The court, however, cleared him of all money laundering allegations.

Delivering judgment, Justice Olayinka Faji acquitted Thomas on five of the six counts filed by the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC), ruling that the prosecution failed to prove its case beyond a reasonable doubt.

The judge held on Thursday that the EFCC admitted during the trial that it did not investigate several claims made by the defendant and had not established that he was unlawfully enriched.

Consequently, the court ordered the EFCC to return all funds seized from Thomas within 14 days, subject to his payment of a? 10 million fine.

The fine followed his conviction on count five, which involved making a cash payment that exceeded the ?5 million threshold allowed by

"While the money was not proven to be proceeds of unlawful activity, the act of paying above the cash threshold is a violation," the judge

Thomas was ordered to pay a ? 10 million fine in lieu of imprisonment and was barred from travelling abroad until the fine is fully paid.

The court also convicted the second defendant, Kabiru Sidi, on the only count against him — for falsely claiming ownership of \$2.1 million dur ing the EFCC's investigation.

Thomas and Sidi were first arraigned on 28 June 2017 on an amended sevencount charge, including conspiracy, unlawful enrichment, and making false statements concerning the movement of

\$2,198,900 allegedly in cash.

In a statement by its Head of Media and Publicity, Dele Oyewale, the EFCC said the duo were arraigned by its Lagos Zonal Directorate 1.

Six of the charges against Thomas centred on money laundering and the unlawful transfer of cash, allegedly in violation of the Money Laundering (Prohibition) Act, 2011 (as amended).

Sidi, on the other hand, was prosecuted for making a false statement to an EFCC

Both men pleaded not guilty at arraignment. In his final written address, prose-cution counsel and Senior Advocate of Nigeria, Ekele Iheanacho, stated, "In line with the charge, the prosecution called six witnesses, and the defendant made a nocase submission, which was overruled and subsequently overruled by the Appellate Court on the grounds that the prosecution had established a prima facie case against the defendant.

The defendant entered his defence because the law required him to show how he acquired the funds legitimately. Part of his evidence was that he made the funds heavily from his farming businesses. The evidence of his farming was contained in his financial statement."

While closing his argument, Iheanacho had also submitted, "This is a case of money laundering, where the issue of concealment of transaction is paramount, and that is why the law requires such transactions to go through financial institutions so that there will be a trial. Any application that suggests otherwise will defeat the basis of Section 1 of the Money Laundering

He therefore urged the court to discountenance the submissions of the first and second defendants and convict them as charged.

NGX records 77% trade decline but market capitalisation increases

N112.2 billion in 138,250 transactions, according to the Nigerian Exchange (NGX) Limited.

Recorded over a five-day trading period, the transaction value dropped by 77.59 percent, compared to the 17.49 billion shares (worth N500.7 billion) exchanged in 142,082 deals last week.

According to the NGX's weekly market report, the all-share index—which measures the performance of all stocks listed on the local bourse — appreciated by 2.18 percent to close the week at 134,452.93, while the market capitalisation increased to N 85.055 tril-

The stock market report showed that the top three performing sectors for the week were the financial services, the agriculture sector, and the oil and gas indus-

lion shares worth at N47.29 billion and traded in 57,121 deals.

According to the bourse, the sector accounted for 57.62 percent and 42.13 percent of the total equity turnover volume and value, respectively.

The agriculture industry followed with 273.69 million shares worth N12.87 billion in 11,284 deals.

The Naira's Dance: Stability and Shifting Sands in the FX Market

he Nigerian Naira has long been a subject of intense scrutiny in the foreign exchange (FX) market, navigating a complex interplay of domestic policies, global economic shifts, and an enduring reliance on crude oil. While recent months have offered glimmers of stability, the Naira's dance remains one of delicate balance, where periods of calm are often punctuated by the shifting sands of global and local dynamics.

A Volatile Past, a Managed Present

For years, the Naira has been characterized by significant volatility, a consequence of factors like high inflation, foreign exchange shortages, and a history of multiple exchange rate windows. The Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) under Governor Yemi Cardoso has, however, embarked on a series of aggressive reforms aimed at unifying these rates and fostering a more market-driven FX environ-

Key among these reforms is the adoption of a "willing buyer, willing seller" model for trade transactions and the consolidation of previously segmented FX markets into the Nigerian Foreign Exchange Market (NFEM). This move, alongside the reintroduction of licensed Bureaux de Change (BDCs) into the official market and the implementation of an Electronic Foreign Exchange Matching System (EFEMS), signals a clear intent to enhance transparency, liquidity, and effi-

Recent Trends: A Glimmer of Stability?

Data from the first half of 2025 suggests a nascent period of relative stability for the Naira. After opening the year around N1,535 per US dollar in the official market, the currency saw a marginal appreciation to close the first half at approximately N1,530/\$, reflecting a year-to-date gain of 0.4%. This can be largely attributed to significant interventions by the CBN, which injected over \$4.1 billion into the market in H1 2025 to curb depreciation pressures.

Furthermore, an increase in dollar inflows, partly driven by a surge in Foreign Portfolio Investments (FPIs) in interest rate instruments and OMO bill subscriptions, has contributed to improved liquidity. The narrowing gap between official and parallel market rates is another positive sign, indicating a reduction in market distortions.

The Oil Factor: A Double-Edged Sword Nigeria's heavy reliance on crude oil exports for foreign exchange earnings means

that global oil prices continue to play a pivotal role in the Naira's fortunes. Higher oil prices generally lead to increased revenue for the government, bolstering foreign exchange reserves and providing the CBN with more capacity to defend the Naira. Conversely, a decline in oil prices can trigger depreciation, making imports more expensive and fueling inflation.

Recent geopolitical tensions, such as the ongoing conflict between Israel and Iran, have spurred an increase in global oil prices. While this presents an opportunity for Nigeria to boost its foreign exchange earnings and potentially strengthen the Naira, it also carries the risk of increased domestic fuel prices and inflationary pressures.

Challenges and the Path Ahead

Despite the recent gains, the Naira's journey towards sustainable stability is not without its challenges:

Sustainability of CBN Interventions: While CBN interventions have provided short-term stability, concerns remain about the long-term sustainability of a currency defense strategy, especially in the face of weak oil earnings and uncertainties around external financing.

Persistent Inflation: Although inflation eased to 22.2% in June 2025, it remains persistently high. High inflation erodes purchasing power and increases demand for stable foreign currencies, putting downward pressure on the Naira.

Foreign Exchange Scarcity: Despite improved inflows, challenges in accessing foreign exchange persist for many businesses, hindering their ability to import essential inputs and service external debt. The existence of a parallel market, albeit with a narrowing gap, underscores this underlying scar-

Structural Issues: Deep-seated structural issues within the Nigerian economy, such as inadequate infrastructure, high interest rates, and corruption, continue to pose significant hurdles to achieving true FX market efficiency and attracting sustained foreign investment.

Opportunities for a Resilient Naira

The path to a more stable Naira lies in a multi-pronged approach that builds on

recent reforms:

Economic Diversification: Reducing Nigeria's over-reliance on oil exports by promoting growth in non-oil sectors like agriculture, manufacturing, and technology is crucial for diversifying foreign exchange earnings.

Sustained Policy Consistency: Consistent and transparent foreign exchange policies from the CBN are essential for building investor confidence and attracting long-term capital inflows.

Enhanced Liquidity: Further deepening the FX market through various instruments and encouraging more participation from diverse sources can improve liquidity and reduce volatility.

Fiscal-Monetary Policy Coordination: Closer coordination between fiscal and monetary authorities is vital to address underlying economic challenges that impact the Naira, such as inflation and budget deficits.

The Naira's dance in the foreign exchange market is a dynamic and complex performance. While recent efforts by the CBN have brought a degree of stability and optimism, achieving sustained strength requires continued commitment to structural reforms, economic diversification, and a consistent, transparent policy environment. Only then can the Naira move from a precarious dance to a more confident and stable stride in the global economic arena.



Cardoso's Stance: Navigating Disinflation Amidst Economic Growth in Nigeria

Inder the leadership of Governor Olayemi Cardoso, the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) is treading a carefully calibrated path, aiming to sustain the nascent disinflationary trend while simultaneously fostering economic growth. This delicate balancing act, underpinned by orthodox monetary policy, reflects a commitment to price stability and a more resilient economic future for Nigeria.

Recent policy decisions by the Monetary Policy Committee (MPC), particularly the consistent hold on the benchmark interest rate (MPR) at 27.5%, underscore the CBN's resolve. This stance, maintained for the third consecutive time, is primarily driven by the need to "sustain the momentum of disinflation and sufficiently contain price pressures," as articulated by Governor Cardoso. The ultimate goal, he reiterates, remains achieving single-digit inflation.

Connecting Policy with Economic Indicators:

Cardoso's approach is firmly rooted in observable economic indicators, which are beginning to show signs of positive response to the ongoing reforms:

Disinflationary Trend: Headline inflation has shown a consistent decline, falling for the third straight month to 22.22% year-on-year in June 2025, down from 22.97% in May. This deceleration is largely attributed by the CBN to a moderation in energy prices, a more stable foreign exchange market, and the anticipated seasonal fall in food prices as the harvest season approaches. While month-onmonth inflation still suggests underlying price pressures, the overall trend is encouraging.

Economic Growth: Nigeria's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) has continued its expansionary path, growing by 3.13% in the first quarter of 2025, an improvement from 2.27% in the same period last year. The recent rebasing of the GDP to N372.82 trillion (\$243.7 billion) in 2024 further highlights a larger, diversifying economy, with the ser-

vices sector, including ICT and financial services, playing an increasingly significant role. The Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) also indicates sustained expansion in the economy.

Exchange Rate Stability and External Reserves: The foreign exchange market has shown sustained stability, a key objective of the CBN's reforms. This stability is accentuated by improved capital flows, increased crude oil production earnings, rising non-oil exports, and a significant reduction in aggregate imports. Gross external reserves have climbed to approximately \$40.11 billion as of July 18, 2025, providing about 9.5 months of import cover. The CBN's efforts to clear FX backlogs and implement a willing buyer-willing seller model have been instrumental in this regard.

Government Collaboration: The CBN acknowledges and appreciates the Federal Government's efforts, particularly in supporting agricultural production through improved security and the provision of farm inputs. This collaboration between

monetary and fiscal authorities is deemed crucial for achieving synchronized objectives of price stability and sustainable growth.

The Balancing Act and Challenges Ahead:

Despite these positive signals, the CBN's stance reflects a cautious optimism. High interest rates, while necessary to curb inflation, pose a challenge for businesses seeking affordable credit, potentially impeding investment and growth in the real sector. Some experts argue that maintaining the MPR at 27.5% could crowd out small businesses and hinder real sector development, with commercial interest rates soaring above 30%.

However, Governor Cardoso and the MPC remain firm in their conviction that the current tight monetary policy is essential until risks to inflation decline sufficiently. The CBN's staff projections indicate further inflation moderation in the coming months, underpinned by the prevailing policy stance, stable exchange rate, declining petrol prices, and improved food supply.

The ongoing efforts to transition to an inflation-targeting framework and strengthen the banking sector through new minimum capital requirements (effective March 2026) are further indicators of the CBN's long-term vision for a stable and robust financial system.

Cardoso's stance is a testament to the CBN's commitment to prioritizing price stability as a foundation for sustainable economic growth. By holding rates steady and continuing to monitor key economic indicators, the CBN aims to solidify the disinflationary trend and restore confidence in the Nigerian economy. While the path remains challenging, the synergy between monetary policy and broader government reforms offers a promising outlook for navigating disinflation amidst the pursuit of sustained economic expansion. The next MPC meeting in September 2025 will undoubtedly be closely watched for further insights into the CBN's evolving strategy.

Senate approves 21.5 billion in external borrowing

It has just been reported that the Senate has approved the Executive's request to borrow some funds both externally and from the domestic capital market. The amount of the loan approved is a staggering 21.5 billion dollars in addition to other related borrowings.

To put the extent of the humongous amount in context, it is in order to recall that Dangote Refinery was built with a colossal amount of about 20 billion dollars and that this amount is multiple times the size of the 2025 National Budget of about 50 trillion Naira. The Senate also approved the issuance of local bonds in the amount of 757.9 billion to clear the backlog of pension arrears. There was also the additional approval to issue 2 billion dollars in foreign currency-

denominated loans to be raised at the Nigerian Stock Exchange.

The request for this loan, it is reported, was submitted by the president to the National Assembly on May 27, 2025. This is a record speed of approval of under two months. It most certainly appears that the race is on for the 2027 election, whose temperature has now been heightened due to developments in the political arena, particularly regarding the ongoing attempt at the formation of a coalition. There is some concern expressed about the mounting debt stock. It is reported that the debt position standards are at 121 trillion Naira with an external component of the equivalent of 43 billion dollars.

The debt-to-GDP ratio has been reported to stand at 39.4%,

which compares with the threshold rate of 40% adopted by the government and the 55% rate recommended by the World Bank and IMF. But the actual problem is with sustainability since we now spend over 80 percent of federal government revenue on debt servicing. We are therefore speedily digging the hole further for us to suffer debt overhang of a scale greater than the one Okonjo-Iwela got us out of as finance minister during the Obasanjo administration. And that situation has untoward implications for fiscal management. In fact, some prominent opposition party figures alluded to the fact that this administration in its two years has borrowed, if added up, more than the other administrations since the return to parliamentary democracy!

FG, SEC, Core International launch capital market quiz for schools

The Federal Ministry of Education, in collaboration with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) and Core International, has launched the Nigerian Capital Market — Secondary Schools Quiz Competition.

The national initiative, aimed at promoting financial literacy and enhancing understanding of capital markets among Nigeria's youth, will involve 370 schools from across Nigeria, with a three-stage tournament format: state-level preliminaries, zonal semi-finals, and a national grand finale.

The event, supported by Financial Markets Indaba, a sister organisation of Core International, will see participating students access a Virtual Trading Platform that simulates real-time stock trading using the

Nigerian Exchange Group (NGX) market data. The competition will run for six months, commencing in September 2025, and will involve 370 schools, 10 from each state of Nigeria and the Federal Capital Territory (FCT).

A statement issued recently, by the Director of Core International and Financial Markets Indaba, Patrick Muzondo, noted that teachers will undergo a dedicated training workshop to support student preparation and facilitate long-term curriculum integration of financial literacy.

According to the statement, "The quiz will equip Nigeria's youth with essential financial knowledge and foundational decision-making skills and also foster a spirit of academic excellence, teamwork, and inclusivity among students."

SMEs urged to embed climate actions for sustainable growth

s climate challenges intensify, small and medium enterprises in Nigeria have been urged to integrate climate initiatives into their business models to drive long-term and sustainable growth.

The experts who made the call at the inaugural edition of the Lagos Green Economy Forum, held recently in Lagos, stress the need to create a roadmap and financing mechanism to motivate SMEs to commit to climate action and sustainability.

Tokunbo Wahab, commissioner for Environment, Water Resources, Lagos, noted that it is vital that small businesses are included in the climate action and sustainability conversations.

He said that this will help educate them on their contribution to climate change, steps to take and provide them with the skills to

make the right decisions to grow sustainably while tapping opportunities in the green space.

Pointing out the need to address the issues of SMEs, he said, "Lagos has well over 8,000 SMEs and driving sustainability is one way of bringing more people into it."

"The steps we have taken as a city to drive sustainability is first of all by providing opportunity for SMEs to get financing to transition from fossil fuel to green power or green electricity where you have solar panels, and things like that," said Wahab who was by Tunde Ajayi, general manager, the Lagos State Environmental Protection Agency (LASEPA).

"We have the Employment Trust Fund where they can get funding, this helps them to scale faster, there is the Ministry of Wealth Creation, where there are a lot of funding opportunities, these help them to scale faster, so all these put together help them drive sustainability," he added.

Speaking also, Korede Oluwole, convener of the event, said that the event is meant to serve as a platform for conversations on sustainability transition for SMEs.

Oluwole noted that SMEs need to learn what sustainability is, "Basically, that is why we have gathered here, to have that conversation with the small businesses in Nigeria."

Speaking on how large corporations are supporting SMEs to transition, Oluwole disclosed, "There is no way a large corporation can function or operate optimally without the strong input of SMEs."

"What some of them have been able to do is to acculturate all the SMEs that work for them, their vendors, their suppliers, because the Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria has given the mandate that by 2030, companies should start reporting their Environmental prospects, so they are doing a lot in doing that," he added.

Sola Obadimu, director-general of the Nigerian Association of Chambers of Commerce, Industry, Mines, and Agriculture (NACCIMA), stressed that immediate action from SMEs on climate issues is critical.

Obadimu noted that the organised private sector reaffirmed its support and readiness to collaborate on initiatives that promote green jobs, attract climate finance and empower cities and communities for a long-time resilience and sustainability.

He appreciated the organisers of the event, noting that it is apt and timely.

The event gathered large corporations to share experiences with SMEs on how they have incorporated sustainable business practices in their supply chain processes, which has resulted in extending and institutionalizing such practices in vendors' businesses.

Olowo urges SMEs to embrace good governance for growth

Rabiu Olowo, executive secretary and CEO of the Financial Reporting Council (FRC), has urged Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) in Nigeria to embrace sound corporate governance practices as a vital strategy for business growth and sustainability.

Speaking at a stakeholder forum organised by the FRC in collaboration with the Lagos Chamber of Commerce and Industry (LCCI) and the Integrity Organisation, Olowo stressed that poor governance remains a major reason why many SMEs in Nigeria fail within a few years of operation.

The event focused on the theme, "Corporate Governance Certification as a Key Strategy for MSME Success in Nigeria." Stakeholders in attendance emphasised that without strong internal systems and proper accountability, SMEs are likely to collapse despite having promising business models.

"Governance is the foundation," Olowo said. "Having good governance for your business is a source of advantage. SMEs are vital for public inclusivity and growth. We must support the SMEs for economic growth."

He revealed that more than 50% of SMEs fail in their first year, and up to 95% shut down before reaching five years. According to him, good governance is not a luxury but the invisible structure that enables SMEs to manage risk, increase accountability, and improve overall resilience.

Echoing this view, Soji Apampa, CEO of Integrity Organisation, said the tendency of some SMEs to prioritise personal networks over regulatory compliance weakens trust in the business environment. "Integrity is no longer just the right thing to do. It is how smart businesses succeed," he said. "SMEs must prove their competence, not just claimit."

Apampa added that corporate governance certification, even though voluntary, helps business owners discover areas for improvement. "The certification brings about integrity. It uplifts your business," he said, urging SMEs to leverage support from institutions like the FRC and LCCI.

Also speaking at the event, Gabriel Idahosa, LCCI president encouraged SMEs to register with credible associations and build networks that support sustainable growth. He advised business owners to prioritise long-term value creation over short-term gains.

"We want SMEs to think longterm. That is how we build sustainable businesses. Join associations like LCCI so we can connect you with investors who want to work with serious, certified businesses," Idahosa said







How digital economy can contribute to the Nigeria's GDP — Oyo Rep Olajide

he lawmaker representing Ibadan North-West/Ibadan . South-West federal constituency of Oyo state, Hon. Adedeji Dhikrullahi Stanley Olajide, recently read for the second time, a bill seeking to provide a legal framework for the growth of Nigeria's digital economy and the institutionalisation of egovernance.

Presenting the bill during plenary, Olajide, who is the Chairman of the House Committee on Digital Information, Communication Technology and Cybersecurity, said the proposed legislation was timely and critical to repositioning Nigeria in the global digital landscape.

According to him, the bill titled "A Bill for an Act to Provide Legal Framework for the Enhancement and Growth of Digital Economy and E-Governance in Nigeria and for Related Matters, 2025", is aimed at promoting efficiency, innovation, service delivery and transparency across all levels of gov-

Olajide explained that the bill which consists of 14 parts and 63 sections, cov-



ering key areas such as electronic transactions, digital payments, ecommerce, government data preservation, digital trust certification and the integration of ICT in public institutions is a blueprint for modern governance, which will in turn provide the legal and institutional backing to digitize public services, reduce waste and promote inclusive access to digital opportuni-

He noted that Ministries, Depart-

ments and Agencies (MDAs) will be mandated to establish ICT units, digitize their services, implement cybersecurity protocols and report annually on their progress, ensuring accountability and sustainability.

Citing economic data, the two term PDP lawmaker said Nigeria's digital economy currently contributes between 16-18 per cent to the national

He projected that with proper legal

backing; the figure could rise to 22 per cent by 2030.

Olajide maintained that the cost implication of the bill's implementation, remains a necessary investment in national development and a pathway to eliminating bureaucratic inefficiencies and corruption through tech nology driven systems, disclosing that the bill is designed to expand the country's digital economy, empower youths and reposition Nigeria as a serious player in the fourth industrial revolu-

Earlier, Hon. Adedeji Stanley Olajide presented before the house, a report of the committee on Digital and Information Technology on the bill for an act to establish Federal Institute of Information Communication Technology, Idanre Ondo state to provide full time courses, teaching, instructions and training in Information Communication Technology and to provide for the appointment of the provost and other officers of the institute to carry out the administration and the discipline of students of the institute and for related matters.

Naira bonds beat EM peers as Tinubu reforms get noticed

resident Bola Tinubu's reforms are sparking the biggest bond rally in emerging markets as the West African nation's two-digit carry yields are backed by increasing government revenue, slowing inflation and a stable currency.

Naira-denominated bonds of Africa's largest crude producer have extended their 2025 rally with an 8.6% total return in July, the best performance among the 23 countries in the Bloomberg EM Local Currency Government Universal Index both for the month and the year.

Since coming to power in May 2023, Tinubu has eliminated fuel subsidies weighing on the government's budget. He followed it up with a tax overhaul, while the central bank has allowed the naira to trade more freely. The measures have helped to reduce the fiscal deficit, boost reserves and keep the current account in surplus. And investors are just beginning to back the reforms, after staying on the sidelines for most of 2024.

"The optics have been constructive this year for Nigeria," said Matthew Reed, head of trading at the Bank of Africa UK Plc in Lon-

don. "The currency has stabilized after a volatile 2024 and this removes a notable hurdle for many international accounts looking to invest in the local bond market."

Government revenues increased 43% in the first half compared to the prior period, and recent tax changes are seen boosting revenue collections further. A rebasing that increased Nigeria's gross domestic product by 30% has improved debt ratios and opened the room for better ratings and fresh borrowing.

The lower inflation, expectation of rate cuts and a more stable naira have made Nigeria a more attractive investment case, said Joseph Cuthbertson, a sovereign analyst at PineBridge Investments in London. Nigeria is on a "positive macroeconomic trajectory following its reform efforts," leaving local debt attractive, he said.

The July rally in naira bonds extends year-to-date gains to 26%, compared with an emerging-market average of 7.1%. That partially recoups a 40% loss suffered by investors last year.

A credit upgrade this year by Moody's has also helped, said Patience Oniha, the head of Nigeria's debt management office.

The ratings company raised Nigeria from Caal to B3 citing "significant improvements in the country's external balance and fiscal position." That placed it on the cusp of "reentering the broader pool of emerging markets considered investable by institutional debt investors," Moody's said.

Despite recent gains, Nigeria's local

bonds are "still attractive," said Aurelie Martin, a fixed-income analyst at Ninety One. The naira has found some stability "reaping the benefits of the tough monetary and fiscal reforms of the past couple of years," while slowing inflation will enable the central bank to cut rates supporting naira notes further.



Reckitt upgrades forecast as Powerbrands sales lifts H1

Reckitt Benckiser has reported a strong first-half performance, with like-for-like (LFL) net sales for its core business up 4.2% year-on-year,

driven by Powerbrands and double-digit growth in emerging markets.

For the six months ending 30 June 2025, the household goods giant, which portfolio

includes brands such as Dettol, Nurofen and Enfamil, posted that its profits were up 1.8%, to £1,714m, while the group's LNL net sales inched up 1.5%.

The half-year financial update comes a mere week after the business also confirmed the divestment of its Essential Home business to private equity firm Advent International for up to £3.6bn (\$4.8bn), in a strategic move aimed at streamlining its operations and sharpening it focus on its health and hygiene portfolio.

It is understood Reckitt will retain a 30% equity stake in the divested unit, which includes brands such as Air Wick and Cillit Bang.

Speaking about divestment, group CEO

Kris Licht hailed the division's offloading "a significant step" in the company's transformation journey:

"We're executing against our strategy with improving volume trends, market share gains, and operating margin expansion. We're now in a position to upgrade our full-year guidance," the chief executive said.

"While there is still much work to do, the journey to fundamentally reshape Reckitt into a more efficient, world-class health

and hygiene company is well underway and reflecting that we are upgrading our LFL net revenue guidance for 2025."

Looking ahead, the business said it was upgrading it outlook and targeting LFL net revenue growth to above 4% in Core Reckitt for FY25, up from its previous prediction of 3% to 4%.

Vodafone backs full-year outlook as pace of decline in Germany eases

Thursday launched a new share buyback as it reported an improved trajectory in Germany and strong growth in emerging markets.

Chief Executive Margherita Della Valle said Vodafone has had a "good start" to the financial year with "strong revenue and [earnings before interest, tax, depreciation, amortisation, and after leases] growth."

"Germany has started its improvement trajectory and our emerging markets are delivering strong broad-based growth. In the UK, we have completed the merger with Three and are moving quickly to combine our networks to benefit customers," she added.

"Today, we reiterate our full year guidance of growth in profit and cash flow. After two years of transformation and change, Vodafone is now well positioned for multi-year growth across both Europe and Africa."

In response, shares in the Berkshire, England-based telecommunications company rose 4.9% to 87.20 pence each in London on Thursday, a 52-week

high. They have risen 24% in the last 12 months.

Revenue in the quarter to June 30, the first quarter of Vodafone's financial year, rose 3.9% to EUR9.39 billion from EUR9.04 billion a year prior.

Within this, service revenue increased 5.2% to EUR7.86 billion from EUR7.47 billion. On an organic basis



service revenue increased 5.5% in the first quarter, picking up slightly from 5.4% in the prior quarter, with growth across all segments apart from Germany.

In Germany, total revenue fell 3.9% to EUR2.98 billion from EUR3.10 billion. Here, service revenue dropped 3.2% to EUR2.69 billion from EUR2.78 billion, the pace of decline slowing from 6.0% in the fourth quarter.

In the UK, organic service revenue increased by 0.9% in the first quarter, slowing from 3.1% in the financial fourth quarter, with growth in Consumer and Wholesale segments offset by a decline in Business due to planned managed services contract terminations.

Total UK revenue rose 14% to EUR1.93 billion from EUR1.69 billion with service revenue of EUR1.65 billion, up 15% from EUR1.43 billion.

Organic service revenue growth in 'Other Europe' was 0.2%, easing from 0.8% in the prior quarter, with good Business growth across the footprint offset by a decline in Consumer in Por-

tugal and Romania. Service revenue in Turkiye increased by 30%.

Africa showed continued strong organic service revenue growth of 14% in the first quarter, flat quarter-on-quarter, supported by above-inflation growth in Egypt, and Vodacom's international markets, driven by demand for data and financial services.

Organic service revenue in Business grew by 4.0%, slowing from 5.1% in the prior quarter, primarily driven by the strong demand for digital services across Europe and Africa.

Vodafone sees full-year group adjusted EBITDAaL of EUR11.3 to EUR11.6 billion and adjusted free cash flow of EUR2.4 to EUR2.6 billion.

In the financial year to March 31, 2025, Vodafone reported adjusted EbitdAaL of EUR10.93 billion and adjusted FCF of EUR2.55 billion.

In addition, Vodafone announced a new EUR500 million share buyback to be run by Goldman Sachs International. The buyback should be completed by November 10, Vodafone said.

CBN holds rates third straight time on cooling inflation

he Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) kept the Monetary Policy Rate (MPR) unchanged at 27.5 percent on Tuesday, signalling continued caution as inflation slows for a third consecutive month.

The decision announced by Olayemi Cardoso, CBN governor, at the conclusion of a two-day meeting of the Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) in Abuja, marked the third straight pause in the current tightening cycle.

All 12 MPC members, he said, voted to hold the MPR, maintain the asymmetric corridor at +500/-100 basis points, retain the Cash Reserve Ratio at 50 percent for deposit money banks and 16 percent for merchant banks, while keeping the liquidity ratio at 30

Cardoso said the committee's decision was "premised on the need to sustain the momentum of disinflation and sufficiently contain price pressures."

Headline inflation eased to 22.22 percent in June from 22.97 percent in May, driven by declines in energy prices and improved foreign exchange stability.

cent, with food and core inflation also accelerating due to higher costs in services, housing, and communication.

The moderation in energy prices, particularly cooking gas, wood, charcoal, and diesel, played a significant role in easing headline inflation," Cardoso told a press conference while addressing the outcomes of the MPC

However, core inflation rose to 22.76 percent in June, up from 22.28 percent in May. reflecting continued cost pressures in nonagricultural sectors.

Cardoso reaffirmed the CBN's long-term commitment to price stability, emphasising the goal of bringing inflation back to single dig-

"The committee remains committed to the bank's price stability mandate and would take appropriate measures to foster stability and confidence in the economy," he said.

Despite some encouraging signs, Cardoso However, month-on-month inflation rose slightly to 1.68 percent, from 1.53 per-geopolitical tensions and ongoing global trade disruptions that could further inflate import



He also noted that the economy grew by 3.13 percent year-on-year in the first quarter (Q1) of 2025, a modest acceleration from the 2.27 percent recorded a year earlier, supported by ongoing foreign exchange reforms and macroeconomic stabilisation efforts, as highlighted in the new GDP rebasing report released on Monday by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS). The Purchasing Managers' Index also continued to show expansion, underlining optimism in the private sector.

Looking ahead, the CBN expects further inflation easing in the coming months, buoyed by tight monetary conditions, harvest-season food supplies, and a stable naira, Cardoso stated.



Community Pharmacists Rally Around Digital Health, Personalized Care At ACPN 2025 Conference

he 44th Annual National Scientific Conference of the Association of Community Pharmacists of Nigeria (ACPN), themed "Technology Integration and Personalized Care: The Future of Community Pharmacy Practice," opened with a strong message: the future of healthcare in Nigeria is digital, personalized and led by community pharmacists.

Held at the International Conference Center (ICC) in Awka, Anambra State, the event branded IFEADIGO 2025 drew key figures from the health sector, academia, government, and traditional institutions, all converging to discuss a bold new direction for pharmacypractice.

From federal regulators and industry captains to traditional rulers and two state health commissioners, the lineup of dignitaries included: Governor Charles Chukwuma Soludo of Anambra State; PSN President, Pharm. Tanko Ayuba Ibrahim; PCN Registrar, Pharm. Ibrahim Babasheu Ahmed; NAFDAC Director-General Prof. Mojisola Adeyeye (represented); and keynote speaker Prof. Chukwuemeka Michael Ubaka, Imo State Commissioner for Health.

Pharm. (Dr.) Ignatius Anukwu, who represented the opening ceremony chairman, Pharm. Ike Onyechi, saluted the enduring resilience of community pharmacists. "ACPN is the face of community practice in Nigeria," he noted, emphasizing their frontline service during the COVID-19 pandemic and beyond. He urged pharmacists to adopt digital innovations to remain relevant in a rapidly evolving health landscape.

In his keynote, Prof. Ubaka declared that "the most impactful healthcare provider in the digital age is not a surgeon or physician but the local pharmacist." He advocated for a transformation in pharmacy practice, integrating digital tools and personalized care to meet the changing needs of communities.

Quoting the World Health Organization, Ubaka underscored the role of pharmacists in advancing Universal Health Coverage (UHC), particularly in managing chronic conditions, promoting immunization, and educating the public. "Community pharmacists are essential to bridging gaps in accessibility, affordability, and continuity of care," he said.

National Chairman of ACPN, Pharm.

Ambrose Igwekamma Ezeh, called attention to the National Drug Distribution Guidelines (NDDG) and commended Anambra State's pharmacy-friendly policies, including the development of Coordinated Wholesale Centres (CWCs), particularly the Oba CWC project.

He called for regulatory harmony between the Pharmacy Council of Nigeria (PCN) and the National Agency for Food and Drug Administration and Control (NAFDAC), urging NAFDAC to respect PCN's statutory role and avoid overlapping directives that could derail pharmacy operations.

"Pharmacists are the heart of our healthcare delivery system," he said. "You keep us safe, healthy, and help us live longer."

He also stressed the need for ethical selfregulation and the adoption of technology. "Technology is everything," Soludo declared, highlighting pharmacists' capacity to leverage AI and digital platforms in delivering quality care.

Pharm. Tanko Ayuba Ibrahim echoed that sentiment, stating, "This conference is a testing ground, and we are satisfied with what Anambra has done." He also announced that Anambra will host the next National PSN Conference.

He lauded the ACPN for their service to communities, calling community pharmacists the "first of pharmacy," since they are often the first point of contact for patients. "It is what they do that reflects on the image of the profession," he said.

PCN Registrar Pharm. Ahmed Babasheu praised the progress made at the Oba CWC and reaffirmed the council's commitment to collaborative regulation, focused on efficient and safe drug distribution nationwide.

As discussions unfolded, the message was clear: community pharmacists must embrace technology, deepen their clinical engagement, and position themselves as central players in Nigeria's healthcare ecosystem.

Representing the Chinese delegation, Secretary General of the China-Africa Geoscience Cooperation Centre, Prof. Hu Peng, reiterated China's commitment to deepening strategic cooperation with African nations, particularly Nigeria.

research and capacity building. Our partners, including Yangtse Automotive and Hubei Wan New Energy, are prepared to invest and support Nigeria's growing industrial sector," he said.

At the meeting, the parties agreed on a framework to facilitate the proposed investment which includes a formal expression of interest from the Chinese firms to the NCSP and a forthcoming technical assessment visit by the NCSP to Hubei Wan New Energy's facilities in China.

The engagement remains part of the NCSP's broader mandate to attract credible international partnerships to stimulate manufacturing, generate employment, and accelerate Nigeria's industrial development.



The MPR Puzzle: Balancing Price Stability and Economic Recovery in Nigeria

he recent decision by the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) to hold its Monetary Policy Rate (MPR) steady at a daunting 27.5% has once again thrown into sharp relief the perennial tightrope walk faced by policymakers in emerging economies: how to tame run-away inflation without suffocating the fragile shoots of economic growth. It's a complex puzzle, with each piece representing a vital, yet often conflicting, objective.

For the CBN, the primary objective, as repeatedly stated by its Governor, Dr. Olayemi Cardoso, is price stability. The logic is clear: high inflation erodes purchasing power, distorts investment decisions, and ultimately undermines confidence in the economy. By aggressively raising the MPR – effectively making money more expensive to borrow – the CBN aims to rein in liquidity, reduce aggregate demand, and consequently, bring down inflation. And indeed, recent data suggests some success, with headline inflation showing a moderation from its peaks.

However, the efficacy of this singular focus comes with a steep price. The current MPR, and the high lending rates it precipitates (often soaring to 35-37% in commercial banks), presents a formidable barrier to the real sector. Businesses, particularly small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) and manufacturers, find themselves caught between the rock of exorbitant borrowing costs and the hard place of a subdued consumer mar-

"You cannot expect industries to thrive and expand when the cost of capital is so crippling," lamented a Lagos-based manufacturer who requested anonymity due to the sensitivity of the matter. "We are forced to pass on these costs, which further fuels inflation, or we simply scale back operations. It's a vicious cycle."

This sentiment is widely shared. High interest rates discourage investment in productive sectors, as the returns on such ventures often cannot outpace the cost of financing. This directly impacts job creation, industrial output, and the overall growth trajectory of the economy. While attracting foreign portfolio investment through high interest rates might offer a temporary boost to foreign exchange reserves, it's often speculative capital, quick to flee at the slightest sign of instability. Sustainable growth, experts argue, is built on robust domestic production and long-term direct investment.

The challenge is further compounded by Nigeria's unique economic realities. Beyond monetary factors, a significant portion of Nigeria's inflation is driven by supply-side constraints: insecurity impacting agricultural output, dilapidated infrastructure increasing transportation costs, and persistent foreign exchange volatility. These structural issues are beyond the direct control of monetary policy and require coordinated fiscal interventions.

"Monetary policy is a powerful tool, but it's not a magic wand that can solve all of Nigeria's economic woes," observes Dr. Adekunle Johnson, an economics lecturer at the University of Ibadan. "While tight-ening monetary policy can curb demandpull inflation, it does little to address the cost-push inflation stemming from insecurity or inadequate power supply. In fact, it can exacerbate the problem by making it

harder for businesses to invest in solutions to these very issues.'

The "MPR puzzle" then becomes apparent:

The Inflation Imperative: The CBN is under immense pressure to control inflation, which disproportionately affects the most vulnerable segments of society and undermines economic planning.

The Growth Dilemma: Aggressive monetary tightening, while effective against inflation, can choke off economic recovery by increasing borrowing costs and dampening investment.

The Structural Straitjacket: A significant portion of Nigeria's inflation is structural and supply-driven, meaning monetary policy alone cannot provide a complete solution.

"Monetary policy is a powerful tool, but it's not a magic wand that can solve all of Nigeria's economic woes," observes Dr. Adekunle Johnson, an economics lecturer at the University of Ibadan. "

The Fiscal-Monetary Coordination Gap: Effective economic management requires seamless coordination between fiscal (government spending and taxation) and monetary policies. When one operates in isolation or in contradiction to the other, the desired outcomes become

The CBN, it seems, is banking on the "long and variable lags" of monetary policy – the idea that the full effects of interest rate changes take time to materialize. They hope that persistent tightening will eventually bring inflation down to a more comfortable level, at which point rates can be eased, paving the way for a more robust recovery.

However, the patience of businesses and ordinary Nigerians is wearing thin. Many are advocating for a more nuanced approach, one that recognizes the need for price stability but also actively nurtures the productive sectors of the economy. This might involve a gradual easing of the MPR as inflation continues its downward trend, coupled with targeted fiscal interventions to address supply-side issues and stimulate demand.

The MPR puzzle is far from solved. The CBN's commitment to price stability is undeniable, but the path to sustainable economic recovery in Nigeria demands a delicate balance, a willingness to adapt, and a concerted effort across all arms of government to address the multifaceted challenges that plague the nation's economy. Until then, the high-interest rate regime remains a bitter pill, one that many hope will eventually lead to a healthier economic future, but one whose immediate side effects are increasingly

Why Dollar Funds Still Dominate: Nigerians Flock to FX Mutual Funds Despite Yield Dip in H1 2025

espite a moderation in returns, dollardenominated mutual funds in Nigeria recorded a robust 12.4% growth in Net Asset Value (NAV) in the first half of 2025, rising to ?1.92 trillion by the end of June. The continued uptick in subscriptions highlights sustained investor appetite for safe-haven assets amid naira depreciation, persistent inflation, and economic uncertainty.

These dollar mutual funds, which primarily invest in Eurobonds and other foreign-denominated fixed-income assets, have retained their status as a key hedge against currency volatility. They remain especially attractive to both retail and institutional investors seeking to protect wealth, preserve capital, and diversify into more stable foreign assets

The year-to-date (YTD) average returns for the segment slipped slightly to 6.73% in June 2025, down from 7.63% recorded at the end of December 2024. Fund managers attribute the decline to a global shift in monetary policy, especially interest rate cuts initiated by the U.S. Federal Reserve and other major central banks, which have reduced the yield environment for dollar-based bonds.

The Debt Management Office (DMO) reported that Nigeria's average Eurobond yields fell from 9.525% in January to 8.534% in June. This trend has inevitably impacted returns for mutual funds heavily exposed to sovereign Eurobond positions.

Still, fund managers are navigating these headwinds by adopting more strategic allocations into high-quality corporate and sovereign Eurobonds and shorter-duration instruments, aiming to optimise returns while managing risks. Notably, many funds continued to deliver competitive performances even in this softening yield environment.

Among the top performers in H1 2025 was the Comercio Partners Dollar Fund, which delivered a 13.70% return and grew its NAV to ?800.57 million with 31 active subscribers. The Futureview Dollar Fund followed with a 13.02% return and ?251.8 million in NAV, while the AVA GAM Fixed Income Dollar Fund posted a 12.59% return with a NAV of ?1.88 billion.

Other strong contenders included the Cowry Eurobond Fund with an 11.67% return and ? 453.8 million in NAV, and the United Capital Nigerian Eurobond Fund, which generated a 9.70% return while commanding one of the largest NAVs at ? 177.53 billion from over 3,700 subscribers. The Meristem Dollar Fund (9.67%), Norrenberger Dollar Fund



(9.56%), Lead Dollar Fixed Income Fund (9.23%), United Capital Global Fixed Income Fund (9.19%), and the FSL Eurobond Fund (8.70%) all posted stable returns despite the tightening landscape.

While returns may have dipped modestly, the resilience of these funds speaks to their strategic importance in diversified portfolios, especially as local inflation erodes nairabased assets and foreign exchange market volatility continues to limit access to hard currency.
